CL: The study of canon law consists of the study of church law and regulation. A number of disciplines are related to this subject: theology of canon law, philosophy of law, fundamental concepts of Roman law, elements of civil law, history of the fundamental canonical structures of canon law, history of the sources of canon law, and the relationship between the Church and civil society.
